



ALLERTON CC v LASHINGS

On Friday 21st July, Allerton Cricket Club welcomed the Lashings World XI – a team of ex-International professional cricketers – to our humble village cricket ground. A full account of the day will come in the September issue of the Allerton News from the ACC captain, Matt Paul, but in the meantime I wanted to share my experience of the coaching sessions that took place in the morning, as it really was a moment that embodied the fantastic community spirit of our local area.

In the morning, around 25 kids from local cricket clubs came to Allerton for a coaching session with some of the Lashings players. This was a wonderful opportunity for them to experience quality tips from players who have competed at the highest level. At one point, I looked over and saw children bowling and batting in the nets, working on their wicket-keeping skills, doing fielding practice and, fundamentally, just enjoying playing cricket at a grassroots level. A lot of the parents stayed to watch



- mainly their kids but also their cricketing heroes at work! - so there was a lovely social atmosphere to the session as well. With many of the girls and boys from the Allertons and surrounding villages, the Allerton Cricket Club should still be going strong in years to come!



Meanwhile, on the other side of the ground, the newly re-formed Allerton Ladies team were also training hard and picking up some pointers from a number of Lashings players. With the likes of Martin Bicknell, Charl Willoughby and Mohammad Ashraful coaching them on bowling and batting skills, their future opponents will (may) be astounded at the new level of skill on display from the Allerton Ladies!

Towards the end of the coaching

sessions, the lunch guests began to arrive and a general sense of anticipation started to build but I will leave the rest of the day and, most importantly, the Allerton CC vs Lashings World XI match (partly because I still don't really know what's going on in cricket matches most of the time!) to Matt to describe in the next issue!

You will be relieved to know that I won't be boring you all with tales of awards for our cider this month, only because we haven't won anymore. However, we have entered the Somerset Cider Competition which is held as part of the Mid Somerset Show on the 20th August, so perhaps next month if we can bribe the judges enough.



July has once again proved to be a very busy month at Ad Astra. 1st July was our second outing with our brand spankingly new branded gazebo, this time at the Wedmore Street Fair. The weather was warm but the wind did get up later in the afternoon. We survived but a few of the other traders were not so lucky and I am sure some of the gazebos are still airborne.

We also used the street fair to launch our first ever Ad Astra Gin! Those observant cider barn customers may have noticed that we don't actually have a spirit still in the cider barn and we aren't brave enough to venture into illegal moonshine activities, so we cannot claim to be master distillers here at Orchardleigh Farm. However, we have friend in North Petherton who is a bona fide "Master Distiller" and who was kind enough to work with us to create our

Poseidon Gin. We will be working with him to create some more products in the coming months...more to follow.

Next up on our road trip was RAF Fairford and the Royal International Air Tattoo (RIAT). With over 200,000 visitors a day, all keen aircraft enthusiasts, this three-day event was always high on our list to attend.

As is usual with British Summers, day one was a complete wash out. The only time the heavy rain stopped was to allow the really heavy rain to start. Very few of the aircraft could fly in such conditions and the cloud was so low that even the Red

Arrows cancelled. Our neighbours in the adjoining trade stand, clearly far more experienced than us, did a roaring trade on hats and umbrellas, however it was not the weather for cider, and we headed back to our hotel soggy and disheartened (at least we weren't camping).

However, days two and three were a great improvement and by Sunday evening we had nearly sold out of everything. All in all it was a great event, and if you get a chance next year to attend the airshow we can highly recommend it.



Attendance at RIAT did mean that we had to miss Harvest Home. A consequence that we were really unhappy about. The Allerton HH is always a highlight of our year, and by the sound of it we missed a cracker. Hopefully next year it will be moved back to September so we will be able to attend once more.

As you may know, we sponsor the Images of Allerton competition that is now in its second year. Over the past six months we had received dozens of entries for the competition and whittling these down to a top three was an exceptionally hard task. MONTHLY RECIPE

Fig & frangipane tart

For those of us lucky to have fig trees in our gardens, soon we will be reaping the rewards. This is my go to recipe for an easy, quick dessert to make use of some of the figs. It is a Gordon Ramsay recipe.

Makes 4-5

Ingredients

500g ready-made puff pastry Flour, to dust 1 egg yolk, beaten, to glaze 10-12 ripe figs

For the frangipane
100g butter, softened to room temperature
100g icing sugar, plus extra to dust
1 large egg, beaten
100g ground almonds
25g plain flour



Method

First make the frangipane. Cream the butter and icing sugar together in a bowl, then slowly add the egg, mixing until it is fully incorporated. Add the ground almonds and flour and fold through until evenly combined. Leave the mixture to rest for about 5 minutes. Heat the oven to 200°C/Gas 6.

Roll out the puff pastry thinly on a lightly floured surface until it is the thickness of a £1 coin. Using a small plate or saucer as a guide, cut out 4-5 rounds from the pastry. Score a 1cm border around the edge of each circle, making sure you don't cut right through the pastry. Lift the circles on to a large baking tray and glaze the border with the egg yolk. Smooth a thin layer of frangipane over the centre of each pastry round.

Slice two figs horizontally into rounds. Cut the rest of the figs into wedges. Arrange on top of the frangipane like a flower, with a fig round in the centre surrounded by fig wedges. Dust with a little icing sugar and bake until the pastry is crisp and golden, about 20 minutes. The pastry border will puff up around the fig flowers.

While still warm, drizzle with honey to glaze. Cool slightly before serving with cream.

Note: I never glaze them and rarely cut out circles - squares are much easier and no pastry wasted. They therefore never ever look like the picture above but they still taste delicious!

On arrival we were greeted with a glass of excellent sparkling rosé, which went some way towards counteracting the efforts of the rain pouring down outside the venue. The end of the talk coincided perfectly with a break in the weather, permitting us to take a tour of the vineyard itself, while our host pointed out the various aspects of the location that worked together to provide the perfect terroir for making wine. After that, we went back inside to sample Aldwick's award-winning wines, along with a very pleasant plate of charcuterie and cheese.

LESTER DURSTON CONTINUES HIS TRAVEL TALES IN SOUTH AMERICA

Into the Atacama Desert

So far on this trip to Chile we had explored the urban centres of the capital Santiago, its port of Valpariso and the coastal resorts of Vina del Mar and La Serena. Things were soon to be very different as we travelled northwards.

South America does not have a significant rail network, unlike much of the rest of the world. Flying is expensive and many places have no airport. The alternative is road transport. A network of busses allows the traveller an efficient and reasonably cheap means of getting about. Some of the journeys cover great distances and are effectively non-stop services, in that the bus will arrive at an intermediate town, several passengers may get off, retrieve their luggage from the hold, and several new passengers will join the bus. It takes but a few minutes and the bus then departs for the next place. Two drivers share the operation of the bus, giving one rest breaks. There is a conductor who serves limited food. The generous seats in the double deck vehicle are just in pairs and fully recline to make comfortable beds.

Our first journey by this public transport took us from La Serena to San Pedro de Atacama

in the heart of this desolate region. It was almost 1200km and took nearly 24 hours! Such a journey in a normal bus would have been a trial.


We had left our hotel in La Serena after a prompt breakfast and arrived in the bright early morning sunshine the following day.

We skirted the northern port city of Antofagasta

and began the long climb eastwards through increasingly bleak terrain.

The **Atacama Desert** is one of the world's harshest non-Polar deserts. It lies between

the Andes ranges and the Pacific Ocean and stretches 1600km north from La Serena right up into southern Peru. Much of it is high plateau, often over 3000m. The desolate landscape has been likened to that of Mars (and has been used not only as a film location, but to test space equipment). Parts have had no recorded rainfall for decades. However, the cold Humbolt Current causes



Evaporation has caused the formation of extensive salt flats, such as the **Salar de Atacama** south of San Pedro, some 3000 sq km in area.





San Pedro began as a small oasis village of narrow dirt streets and adobe houses. Since the 1990s it has become the centre of tourism but was a settlement from pre-Hispanic times and an important trading post between the Pacific coast and the lands across the Andes to the east. Many properties now catered for tourists as places to stay, eat or buy handicrafts. It was a hub for the excursions to explore the natural wonders around.









The church looked out on the plaza in the centre but the fringes of the village were rough and ready. The cone of the extinct volcano **Licanabur** (nearly 6000m) formed the horizon to the east.



Later in the day we were taken out to the Salar with its surreal topography of salt deposits.





Amidst the dazzling white expanses were areas of clear water, the home of colonies of feeding flamingos, native to the Atacama.





On higher ground above the salar were several small settlements where there was fresh



water, enabling modest crops to grow. One was Socaire, some 70 km south of San Pedro. It was little more than a collection of simple dwellings and a modest grass-thatched church. Cultivated terraces were

nearby. We were watched by a donkey, penned in beside a











Yet more volcanos form the horizon.

In the same area as Socaire were a couple of smaller salt flats surrounding turquoise lakes each with its shoreline of encrusted salt and a backdrop of volcanic peaks.

In complete contrast to the slight fertility of these small oases was the **Valle de la Luna**, the Valley of the Moon. This we visited on our late afternoon return to San Pedro. It was devoid of any vegetation and deserved its name.





Not far away was an even more barren valley, the **Death Valley.** Viewed from the rim of the rugged scenery the edge of San Pedro was visible whilst, several parked vehicles on the valley floor appeared as miniatures. A feature of this part of the valley was a huge sand dune that had formed of wind-blown debris. It provided a good opportunity for dune running or sand boarding.









We lingered for quite a while, marvelling at this amazing sight but soon the sun began to set. We made our way back to San Pedro. We had to be ready for a very early start tomorrow, a two and a half hour drive before dawn!

The Parish Church Council met early in the month to discuss two important issues. Please do contact us with your thoughts and comments on either of these issues - they would be genuinely welcome:

- Living in Love and Prayer. The Church of England does not currently allow same-sex marriage in church, but General Synod has recently approved a proposal that individual parishes may decide for themselves whether to offer a Service of Blessing on same-sex marriage and partnerships. A special Order of Service, distinct from the marriage sacrament, is being developed for this. The Allerton Parish Church Council will soon have to decide whether they wish to offer this in our church.
- Clergy Deployment in Axbridge Deanery. A plan has been drawn up with proposals for how to manage the forthcoming reduction in clergy posts in Axbridge Deanery from 9 (now) to 7 (by 2026). The most obvious change for us is that Mark Parish will join the Isle of Wedmore Benefice (of which Allerton is a part) to make it a five-church benefice (Wedmore, Theale, Blackford, Allerton and, now, Mark). This will clearly mean our vicar Richard Neill's time will be spread more thinly than it was, which will require greater engagement by the Lay members of the church, although the details of this have yet to be worked out. The PCC provisionally approved this proposal, acknowledging that such changes are inevitable in the circumstances, and must be faced head on. We will need to work together and be prepared do things differently.

It reminded me that what we see in the Circus Tent and with other performers is the tip of hour after hour of practice (though how you safely practise a three motorbike sphere of death I'm not sure!) and that it is almost always dependent on the support of others spending time in patient encouragement.

The fourth of July this year saw the thirtieth anniversary of my ordination, when I became a minister with a dog collar. I thank God for all those in this place and others who have made that possible through their encouragement, love and prayer.
