

#### Other News:

During the summer holidays, the Clerk has been working hard to update the suite of policies available to the Parish Council and several were adopted at the September meeting; Training & Development Policy, Privacy Notice & Data Protection and GDPR Policy. These will continue to be updated and adopted over the coming months.

Next month the Parish Council will look at how it can support with the installation of another defibrillator in the village. Research shows that using a defibrillator within 3-5 minutes of collapse can produce survival rates as high as 50-70%. For the defibrillator to be stored outside (for it to be accessible 24 hours a day) a cabinet will require power

to maintain the temperature of the defibrillator and the pads etc. If anyone can recommend a location, then please contact the Clerk (details below).

# SOMERSET COUNCIL BRIEFING SHEET SEPTEMBER 2023

**Council Finances:** Somerset Council has warned that it will have to draw on reserves for the second successive year to meet its budget for 2023/24. A recent Executive report describes the council's financial position as "stark and challenging". The latest budget gap for the current year is £28.6m. The papers reveal that the Council has already drawn £18 million from reserves to fund spending beyond the 2022/23 budgets. These figures are despite an £18.5m annual bonus created by moving to a Unitary Council and which were planned to be fully realised by next year.

**Covid autumn booster programme**: As the result of a newly identified variant the Covid-19 vaccine is being brought forward by one month and offered to those at high risk of serious disease and who are therefore most likely to benefit from the

vaccination. Specifically, JCVI advises the following groups to be offered a Covid-19 booster vaccine this autumn:

- residents in a care home for older adults
- all adults aged 65 years and over.
- persons aged 6 months to 64 years in a clinical risk group.
- frontline health and social care workers
- persons aged 12 to 64 years who are household contacts of people with immunosuppression.
- persons aged 16 to 64 years who are carers and staff working in care homes for older adults.

Booster vaccinations are now planned to start on September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

**Flu vaccinations:** NHS England has confirmed it will start by prioritising flu vaccinations for children from September, to prevent children from getting seriously ill and to break the chain of transmission to the wider population. School aged children will be able to get the flu vaccine at school or at community clinics, Children aged two and three years will be able to get an appointment with their GP practice. This year, based on the latest scientific evidence, the JCVI has recommended adults over the age of 65 and those with underlying health conditions will be eligible for a vaccination in the winter months. The flu season typically peaks in January when more people gather indoors.

**Roundabout sponsorship:** Local businesses are being invited to take advantage of roundabout sponsorship to advertise socially responsible goods and services. The space is available for advertising a wide range of goods and services. The new ethical advertising policy means that the Council will not sanction certain adverts such as those promoting junk food, fossil fuels, gambling or consumption of alcoholic drinks. The money generated by the initiative will go back into the Council's highways maintenance budget although not specifically earmarked for roundabout maintenance.

**Soft plastics recycling:** More than four tonnes of plastic bags and wrapping such as bread bags and confectionery packets, have been collected for recycling as part of the Council's role in a national project to expand recycling collections. The small-scale pilot involving 3,600 homes across two locations in Frome started at the end of May.



## MONTHLY RECIPE

## **Bramble Mousse**

## **Ingredients:**

- 450g blackberries
- 120g caster sugar,
- 2 tbsp of lemon juice,
- 3 tbsp of cold water,
- 1 sachet gelatine (12g)
- 150ml double cream,
- 3 egg whites



#### Method:

- 1. Gently heat the blackberries, sugar and lemon juice in a pan, then cover and simmer gently until the fruit is soft.
- 2. Place the cold water in a small dish or cup, sprinkle on the gelatine and leave to stand for three minutes.
- 3. Take the pan from the heat and stir in the sponge-like gelatine until dissolved.
- 4. Pass the fruit mixture through a sieve and make a purée and allow it to cool until it shows signs of setting.
- 5. Whisk the cream until it forms soft peaks and fold into the purée.
- 6. Stiffly whisk the egg whites and fold in.
- 7. Pour into a serving dish or individual ramekins and leave to set.
- 8. Freezes well.
- 9. Decorate with whole blackberries just before serving.

#### **NEWS FROM ALLERTON WI**

Based in Weston Super Mare, the charity has been running for over 30 years providing free care and palliative services for patients with life limiting illness including Cancer, Motor Neurone Disease and Parkinson's disease.

Kirsty explained all about the upcoming fundraising events Weston Hospice Care are planning and how the money may be used.

## Peru The Land of the Incas


I have been recounting my journeys following the Pacific coast and the Andes of South America and had reached the northern part of Chile. Travelling north takes one into **Peru**, the third largest country on that continent. It was the first visit we had made to this huge landmass, its very varied landscapes, its people and its history. It had been the start of some truly amazing experiences.



This trip began in **Lima**, Peru's capital, which is roughly in the middle of the Pacific coastal desert, and home to about a third of the country's now 34 m population. Then, we flew from London via Madrid, Bogata (Columbia), and Quito (Ecuador), each leg on a different airline. Lima was a sprawling modern city with little remaining of its colonial past and for much of the year shrouded in fog, thanks to the cold Humbolt current that passes up the Pacific coast. After the briefest of stays we flew up to one of Peru's gems, **Cusco**. It is situated in the Andes at 3326m (almost 11,000'). Flying straight up from sea level in Lima, proved an abrupt introduction to high altitude, but the clear azure sky and crisp air were compensation. One just had to take things slowly for

several days.

Cusco's origins are lost in myths, but it became the capital of a tribal grouping that probably began in the 12<sup>th</sup>c. By early 15<sup>th</sup>c a period of significant expansion began and reached its peak at about the time that the Spanish arrived in the Americas. The **Incas** were not the first such indigenous empire but were by far the largest and longest lasting. The *conquistador* **Francisco Pizarro** reached Cusco in 1533. The Inca empire of the time had two rival capitals, **Cusco** and **Quito** to the north, in present day Ecuador. There had been a civil war between these two factions that had severely weakened both. As a consequence, the small number of Spaniards soon achieved conquest. Being a seafaring nation, the Spanish established their capital in 1535, on the coast, now Lima. Cusco's importance gradually waned.




Some Spaniards remained in Cusco and slowly added their architecture to that of the Incas. The large central square became the Plaza de Armas, although smaller than in Inca times. The main building is the **Cathedral** begun in 1559, but it took one hundred years to complete. It is flanked by two other smaller churches.



Nearby is the **Church of Santo Domingo**, built on top of the main Inca temple of Cusco. Earthquakes have destroyed later buildings several times, but Inca walls have withstood destruction. Elsewhere are streets with extensive walls of massive Inca masonry.

Cusco sits in wide valley but many of the streets climb





the quite steep slopes. Most of the houses are two storey and often have balconies overlooking the street. Some are of wrought iron but others are of elaborately carved wood.






Our time in Cusco coincided with the Festival of Corpus Christi, one of the main religious celebrations. Here it was observed over three days, starting with a procession. The image of each church's patron saint was carried through the streets to the cathedral. The heavy statues were clothed in elaborate robes and carried by



twenty to thirty men bearing the heavy load of the litter on stout timbers resting on their shoulders. The strain was evident on the faces of these men. Some teams were



and coloured knitted hat with prominent earflaps.



Some women wore crisp white blouses but others had colourful knitted cardigans, full skirts and a multipurpose shawl around their shoulders (useful for carrying goods or children).

Large crowds sat on the cathedral steps watching the chaotic throng. Bands of wind instruments accompanied the saints, each playing a different and discordant "tune". Truly an amazing spectacle.



Later in the day feasting began. In the streets around the *plaza* food was being prepared on numerous stalls.

All sorts of vegetables, including the native potato, were being cooked in


various ways. The air was filled with choking smoke from the many cookers and barbecues. This mingled with all manner of aromas.





Meat too was in plenty. There was the Peruvian delicacy, roast guinea pig. The domesticated rodent is skinned, gutted and roasted whole, displaying the prominent incisor teeth. This differentiated the modest morsal from a similar sized rat.

On the hilltops overlooking Cusco are the sites of several Inca ruins.



The "must see" sight in Peru is of course **Machu Picchu**, S America's most spectacular archaeological site. It is not mentioned in any Spanish chronicles and was unknown to the outside world until 1911. An American historian **Hiram Bingham** was searching for the lost city of **Vilcabamba**, known to be the last Inca stronghold. He stumbled on the ruins at Mach Picchu by accident, lost in enveloping forest. The remains at **Espiritu Pampa**, much deeper in the jungle, discovered some years later, are "Vilcambamba". In the first half of the 1900s the forest was laboriously cleared, and some reconstruction of likely buildings carried out. Historians have much discussed the purpose of the site, and some think it may have been abandoned before the Spanish conquest. In the 1980s more terracing was uncovered on the precipitous mountain sides around. An even larger city was later discovered just a few km away.

Intrepid travellers reach Mach Picchu along the Inca Trail. The trail takes three to four days of arduous

trekking and camping, over difficult terrain and at high altitude.



Lesser mortals can take a train, on a route running west from Cusco, indicated on the map as the broke orange line.





The station for Machu Picchu is at the small village of **Agua Calientes.** Here the otherwise single track is doubled to allow trains to pass. It was a hub of activity for the village. Several modest cafes

served food at tables on the platform. Other trade was done. Things became really busy when the regular train, used by the locals, pulled in.

The railway line runs in

the valley of the **Rio Urabamba**. The site of Machu Picchu is several km away, higher on the mountains, overlooking the river, and accessed by a modern track that zig zags up the steep slopes.

The views were unique.



The total silence of this magical place was memorable. Often the surrounding mountains are shrouded in cloud but today all was clear.

Other Inca sites are in the **Sacred Valley**, to be visited in the next couple of days, after a night in a hostel in Agua Calientes and breakfast on the station platform.

Matthew admitted that he had cried, and was made to stand on a chair, while Kevin thought school ended at break time, so walked the mile home through the centre of Manchester, where his mother promptly took him back to school! It was a very happy service.

We were also pleased that some members of the Parish Church Council were able to attend the visit of Bishop Ruth, the Bishop of Taunton, to a meeting of the Deanery in Wedmore Village Hall. Around fifty people attended, representing all the Benefices in the Deanery, and there was a lively discussion about what our communities should be like, and how our churches could (and should?) contribute to this, against a background of declining congregations and shortages of money. There are no easy answers!

Because of financial pressures across the Church of England, and specifically in the Bath & Wells Diocese, it has been reluctantly decided to reduce the number of working clergy in the Diocese. This will be done by natural wastage (no redundancies), but by 2026, the number of clergy in Axbridge Deanery (of which we are a part) will reduce from 9 (now) to 7, so will inevitably be spread more thinly across the 27 churches in Deanery. Our own vicar, Richard Neill, will have to cover five churches – Wedmore, Allerton, Theale, Blackford and Mark. This will clearly involve a reduction in his "presence" in the individual parishes. The details of



this have yet to be worked out, but we sincerely hope that by using a combination of our own Lay Worship Assistants, plus occasional appearances by local retired clergy etc, we will be able to sustain a weekly service in Allerton, but this is going to be difficult. Nevertheless, the Allerton Parish Church Council has provisionally approved this arrangement, acknowledging that such changes are inevitable in the circumstances, and must be faced head on. We will need to work together and be prepared do things differently.

And lastly, the good news! Jane and Andrew Midgley have just celebrated their 57<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary, and we were delighted to celebrate with them at our service on 10<sup>th</sup> September, and to thank this wonderful couple for all their hard work and dedication to the church over the last fifty years, including as Churchwardens,

Treasurer, organisers of Quest, and many other roles.

## **Bishop Ruth writes:**

What an opportunity!

This week I was on a Zoom chat with some of our chaplains around the diocese. I meet regularly with eight or nine of them alongside our Chaplaincy Development Adviser Mike Haslam. These are only a few of the more than 300 chaplains we have, of all ages, lay and ordained, across Bath and Wells.

There are more and more enquiries about chaplaincy from a wide range of communities. They are seeking a chaplain to offer pastoral care and well-being support for an increasingly stressed and anxious workforce. One particular enquiry caught my attention this week.

A local Further Education college has been saying that their first concern is for a chaplain to address the spiritual exploration of its students. What an opportunity! We know from the Talking Jesus research (2015 and 2022) that most practising Christians come to faith before the age of 18. Several of our schools, including primary, have pupil chaplains now and this is a great way of recognising that you are never too young to start in living and telling the story of Jesus!

As a child I was always struck by the Old Testament story of the unnamed little slave girl who served Naaman's wife, (2 Kings chapter 5). Taken from her home to another country, and placed in an alien environment, she was the one who introduced Naaman to Elisha the prophet in Israel. As a result, Naaman overcame his scepticism, was healed from his leprosy, and discovered a faith in God.

Chaplaincy opens up a diversity of contexts in which we can share our faith and I invite you to pray for those here in Bath and Wells who are treading new ground to open up the way for others to discover the love of Jesus for themselves.

However, each one of us has our own possibility of being a chaplain, coming alongside another in our daily life and community. Sometimes our timidity prevents us from speaking up about faith and our personal spiritual journey other than in church where we are known and on familiar territory.

How about taking some time to reflect on where you might live and tell the story of Jesus outside of church, in your everyday context? Is there someone, like a Naaman's wife who is desperate to find help and hope for a loved one but doesn't know where to find it? Maybe you are the only one who could tell them!

Harvest gifts of non-perishable food given at the services will be offered to Cheddar Valley Foodbank.




